Yemen Humanitarian Update, August 2018



The hostilities in Al-Hudaydah governorate continue to intensify, particularly in Ad Durayhimi city, where there are significant casualties. The intensity of the fighting, shelling and airstrikes has prevented ambulance services from reaching this area, which is south of Al-Hudaydah city. Some families have been able to escape to neighboring districts and Al-Hudaydah city. However plenty of families remain trapped in Ad Durayhimi. Humanitarian actors are trying to evacuate wounded people from Ad Durayhimi. Overall, more than 50,800 households (355,600 individuals) have been displaced by the ongoing conflict in Al-Hudaydah.

On August 9, an airstrike in Sa'ada governorate struck a bus in a market area, which killed 46 people and injured 75 others. Most of those who died were children aged 10 to 13 years. Along with the UN Secretary General and humanitarian agencies, ADRA condemned this attack. Between March 2015 and June 2018, UNICEF estimates that 2,398 children have been killed and 3,652 children have been maimed because of the war in Yemen.

According to UN OCHA, more than 7.4 million people in need are located in areas with significant access constraints. Out of this, 1.4 million people are located in high access severity levels, a 200,000 increase from February 2018.

The current complexities in Yemen are compounded by the depreciation of the Yemeni Riyal. In August 2018, exchange companies in Sana'a city bought 1 USD at a rate of 560 YER, which marks the lowest recorded rate. Consequently, commercial goods are rising, thus, exacerbating the needs and living conditions of those already affected by the war.

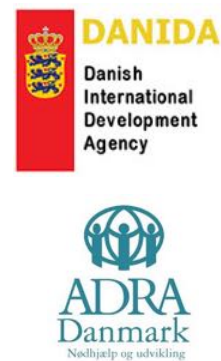
During the reporting period, the WRM team continued the project activities as well as RRM response in the targeted areas. 139 households were verified in Al-Saneef village to receive hygiene kits and construct latrines. The team has also trained the water user committees of the new water points on chlorine testing and taking FRC readings. The technical team has completed preparing the technical drawings and BoQs for 8 new water points and 167 ventilated improved pit latrines. As part of the RRM response, the project team continued the verification process for the newly displaced households in Al Marawiah and Bajil districts, where a total of 6,545 households were reached. Thousands of RRM kits were also distributed in the targeted areas during the reporting period.

Cash-For-Work Team started and completed the 5th and 6th activities of cleaning campaign and outreach awareness sessions with 50 beneficiaries for each activity in blocks 2, 3, 6, 23, 24, and 25. The activity lasted for 22 days from mid-July to mid-August. Cash-For-Work team has held 4-hour business plan training for all the beneficiaries of cash for work of 5th and 6th activities (46 males, 54 females) divided into 3 batches. In addition, hygiene awareness sessions have been conducted for households and other family members of blocks 2, 3, 6, 23, 24, and 25. Food baskets were distributed to the same 100 beneficiaries of Cash for Work after completing the activity of cleaning campaign and outreach hygiene awareness sessions

On the other hand, community committee members conducted several trainings on conflict management and resolution as well as humanitarian work and humanitarian principles. Several awareness sessions were carried out on protection issues to improve beneficiaries' protection mechanisms.

The situation in Hudaydah has shown no signs of improvement, with the military affront extending to more governorates in Hudaydah. The escalation in hostilities has led to an increased displacement in several villages in Marwiah and Aslem. In order to target more beneficiaries, ADRA has deployed a health team in the second and third catchments of the targeted static health facilities. The mobile medical teams were able to target more than 1500 IDPs residing with host communities in far off villages, providing them with emergency medical and health assistance. Emergency medical treatment also meant that diseases were limited before their spread. The EMACH IV health teams for this period provided 1305 health consultations. Out of the total cases, the project was able to identify, treat and report (through the project lab) one case of diphtheria, as well as 281 suspected cases of cholera, out of which 210 were confirmed. A total of 456 pregnant and lactating females received comprehensive ANC in the health clinics. EMACH IV provided mental health support and referral to 319 cases.

The OTP nutrition unit could identify 476 malnutrition cases, which were immediately enrolled in the appropriate outpatient nutrition programs.





Malnourished cases with complications were admitted into the TFC in Kamaran hospital in Hudaydah, and those in Hajjah were referred to the TFC managed by ACF in Hajjah. The number of inpatient cases in TFC reached 102 children under five. The project through IYCF corners also provided health, nutrition and hygiene

awareness to 4185 beneficiaries during the previous period, and 511 beneficiaries received family planning information. In order to fortify prevention, the project conducted 451 routine vaccines for children U5.

The project continued to provide integrated health and nutrition services in the target districts of Al-Jawf. Through the static and mobile teams, the project was able to reach more villages especially in Al-Hazm district. Introducing outreach teams in Al-Hazm was important in order to ensure that remote areas are able to access the services. During the month of July ADRA targeted a total of 15,048 with PHC as well as nutrition activities.

The OTP clinics stationed at each of the targeted health facilities in the 5 districts could screen over 856 cases of which 108 cases were identified to suffer from SAM, meanwhile 242 were enrolled into the MAM program. Through MUAC screening and community

referrals 142 PLW identified with malnutrition were enrolled within the SFP. The cases continued to be monitored through the nutrition cards as well as before and after pictures, which recorded the progress of the case. However; much like in the past reporting period the default cases remain at 20 per cent.

IDPs



The project targets internally displaced persons affected directly or indirectly by the conflict. The project will target IDPs, and conflict affected vulnerable communities in the two main northern hubs, the Sana'a hub (excluding Amran), and Hudaydah hub.

The latest number of displaced households throughout the country is 2,179,278 with approximately 1,267,525 individuals residing in this project's target areas. The project aims at providing Shelter & Protection assistance to 50,900 IDPs in the target areas. The assessment process has given information on the exact numbers displaced persons and has determined which families or individuals are most in need of assistance. Multi-purpose cash support was given to the most vulnerable IDPs (low-income families with many children, families that include persons with special needs, single parents). The number reported does NOT include the lists reported to UNHCR as they have not been verified yet .

The number of cases receiving legal assistance in all IDPs centers reached 1,625 cases, 53 of which were provided in the transit sites. 788 IDPs were provided with ID cards. During the reporting period, a total number of 1,063 IDPs received psychosocial counselling services, 352 of which were provided in the transit site. The number of displaced persons who were provided with social counseling services reached 6,850 (211 in the transit site.)



An awareness session was held by CPBN members discussing the following topics: IDPs rights to reach food, health facilities, human shelter and education, expose them to the organizations that provide humanitarian assistance, and avoiding fraud by not paying money in exchange for humanitarian services.

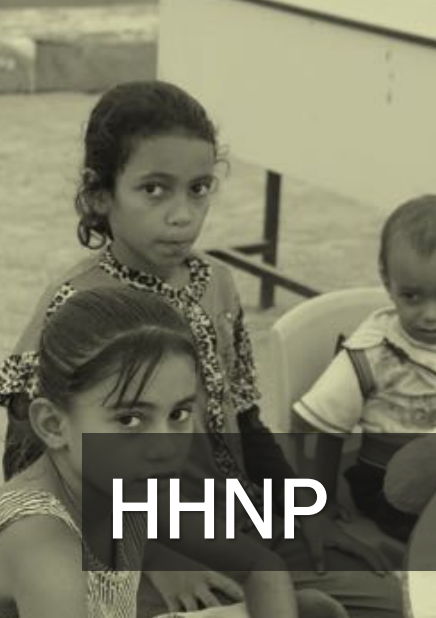
7,964 attended 44 awareness sessions held by staff (679 attended 42 awareness activities in the transit site.) During the reporting period, 334 cases were referred to other partners (124 referrals at the transit site, 4 to the social counsellor at the Community Center and 59 to the psychosocial counsellor.

Rental subsidies were provided to 1,829 vulnerable households. ADRA-IDPs facilitated the distribution of core relief items received from UNHCR to 2,112 IDP households, 559 of whom reside inside the hosting sites .

138 IDP households in Dhamar were provided with shelter kits. RRM Kits were distributed to 11,024 IDP HH from Al Hudaydah, 558 of whom live inside the hosting sites. During Eid Holiday, recreational events were held to spread the joy among the IDP children from Al Hudaydah. Those events helped the children to get off the feeling of being displaced for four days during Eid. Those events targeted 75 children residing in Abu Bakr School.

Nine schools were provided with 356 gas cylinders. 7 schools were provided with kitchen tools, three additional schools will be supported with kitchen tools. Also, 9 schools were repaired and one school is planned to be repaired.

According to 2018 YHRP, Some 1.8 million children and 1.1 million pregnant or lactating women are acutely malnourished, including 400,000 children under the age of five who are suffering from severe acute malnutrition. An estimated 7.5 million people are in need of nutrition assistance, with 2.9 million people who will require treatment for acute malnutrition in 2018.



In Hudaydah, the security situation is deteriorating day by day, the conflict reaches to Hudaydah airport and moving ahead to the city of Hudaydah, the humanitarian situation is miserable. According to NAMCHA report, there are 22,163 households originating from Al Hudaydah who fled from the conflict area are currently

staying in Sana'a City . In Hajjah, the front line is approaching to Aslem district where ADRA is implementing a nutrition project in Aslem health center (Al-Thalooth) . In Abyan, Al-Dhale'e and Lahj, the security situation is a bit stable compared to Hudaydah and Hajjah, however, several bombing attacks were observed by AQAP in Abyan and Lahj.

Screening, detection and referral number of 4,410 children under five and PLW. Also, providing treatment of MAM for children between 6 - 59 months and PLW for a number of 1,325 cases. On the other hand, 5454 beneficiaries were reached with nutrition awareness.

IESAL



In preparation for food distribution, food vouchers have been printed. Currently, ADRA is finalizing the prices of the contents of the food basket with local vendors. The project is targeting 650 HHs in the Harib Al Qaramish district for food distribution.

The livelihoods component of the project is taking shape as field workers have conducted verification surveys on household beneficiaries. Upon completion, a list of items, equipment, and materials, related to each trade, will be prepared so that procurement and distribution can follow afterwards.

13 water points in Hareeb Al Qaramish received about 1,017,296 liters of water supply. In addition to this, awareness sessions in clean water usage, personal hygiene, and handwashing was conducted. In total 266 people (161 males & 105 females) benefited from these awareness sessions.

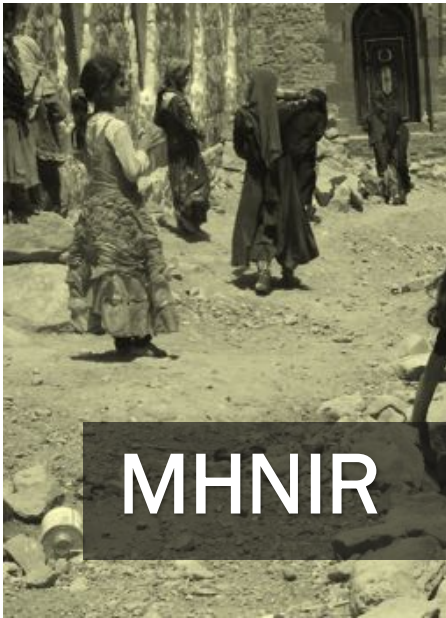
SAWA



The SAWA project seeks to provide improved access to clean water, sanitation, and hygiene for 30,000 displaced individuals. ADRA intends on achieving this objective through the rehabilitation of water points, distribution of chlorine tablets, desludging of sewage system, distribution of hygiene kits, and conducting training sessions on waste management and disposal.

Currently, ADRA is awaiting the signed agreement from local authorities in order to commence with project implementation. Additionally, ADRA met with GARW (General Authority of Rural Water) to discuss the general project scope and possible intervention in Al-Hattaresh, which suffered major flooding in August. A needs assessment was conducted in Al-Hattaresh. The Deputy Minister of Water has shared a list of 11 water points in Amanat Al-Asimah that require rehabilitation.

While these preparations were made, staff members undertook a communication skills workshop for the purpose of improving the methods and skills in Behavior Change Communication.

MHNIR



The MHNIR project is currently rehabilitating three health facilities in Harib Al Qaramish district in Marib Governorate. After the renovation work is completed, ADRA will be supporting the operations of these health facilities by building their capacity through a Community Management of Malnutrition Approach (CMAM). The project will result in improved utilization of essential health services by IDPs and host communities. Specifically, women and children under 5 will be targeted so that there is a reduced prevalence of acute malnutrition to this population.

So far, the procurement of medications is already underway. These supplies are being prepositioned alongside medical workers, who have already been selected. Soon, mobile health

teams will be deployed to conduct awareness sessions, medical consultations, and trainings for health workers.

ADRA distributed 1,925 beehives and beekeeping materials and equipment. ADRA also followed-up on 5,950 beneficiaries who received irrigation equipment. 64 people were trained on small business management and business plan creation.

Through the project's WASH component, ADRA rehabilitated 11 water systems that serve a number of 4,900 beneficiaries. Moreover, 1,427,500 liters of chlorinated drinking water are pumped daily for 34,917 beneficiaries, through rehabilitated water systems. 162,750 liters of chlorinated drinking water are delivered through water trucks for a number of 10,850 beneficiaries as well as a distribution of 25,060

hygiene kits.

The nutrition component of the project saw the admission of 484 children and 366 pregnant and lactating women to health facilities providing SAM/MAM. Out of these patients 401 children and 179 PLW were treated and discharged from health facilities. IYCF messages were provided to caregivers, which, in turn, was distributed among 1,071 children.

The ECR project is a new project within ADRA's portfolio. The project aims at building community based resilience and response to the current surge of conflict along the Western Coast, in line with the cluster specific objectives. Through the establishment and reactivation of community based protection networks, the project aims at tracking protection risks and grave human rights and GBV violations, as well as the provision of community based and tailored responses and solutions. Moreover; ADRA proposes to lead the Protection Coordination team on the regional level, to ensure an effective and synergic response to the current crisis. The proposed response will be targeting two main hubs where an expected increase of displacement as well as hostilities is anticipated to occur; Hudaydah Hub and Sana'a Hub. This project will function through ADRA's current IDP Community Centers in Hajjah, Dhamar and Amanat Al-Asimah as the fixed center for the activities, with community based outreach activities to support communities as well as build the resilience to future shocks.

The project aims at the provision of the following of the following emergency services to conflict affected communities:

- 1- Establish new, or support existing, Community Based Protection Networks
- 2- Lead the regional response through sub-cluster coordination.

The project will derive from ADRA's extensive global experience (in partnership with UNHCR) working on Protection and Shelter Emergency Response Program for IDPs.
